In the Vespers of 1610 Claudio Monteverdi gives us a work which is one of the landmarks of western choral music. Fusing together sacred and secular texts, and using both traditional forms of plainchant and Renaissance polyphony – he was a master of the madrigal form – he creates something completely new for its time.

With an orchestra of period instruments, this is the first performance by HCS of this towering achievement of Renaissance music, and the earliest dated major work ever presented by the Society. The Baroque works often so closely associated with HCS – those of Handel and Bach for example – owe a huge debt to Monteverdi, whose genius ushered in a new era, and to this work in particular.

This performance draws on the whole family of HCS choirs, with participation from both the Youth Choirs and HCS Voices.



Vespers of 1610

Neither the titles 'Vespers of 1610' nor 'Vespro della Beata Vergine' – both of which are the commonly used names of Monteverdi's most famous work – appear in the title page of the original 1610 score printed in Venice, and it is not certain that Monteverdi himself ever used these descriptions.

Instead the work bears the rather cumbersome moniker of (in translation) Mass in 6 voices for the Most Holy Virgin, and Vespers for several voices with some sacred songs, suitable for Chapels and Princely Chambers.

This suggests that the publication was intended as a collection which could be dipped into. There are indeed 13 numbers, though some editions add further material and the final *Magnificat* is a significant work in itself.

(The HCS performance will follow the Oxford University Press edition).

Modern performances present the work as a whole, though there are several ways in which the detail of performance can differ. It's worth noting that when we say 'modern' we do mean it. No recording was made of any part of the composition until 1953, and then only excerpts. Now much recorded, the Vespers is still fairly rare in concert performance, as it calls for large forces — up to 7 solo singers, a chorus large enough to divide into as many as ten parts, organ, and an orchestra including baroque strings, cornettos, theorbos, or their nearest modern equivalents.

Claudio Monteverdi

Born in Cremona in 1567, Claudio Monteverdi was a musical prodigy, producing his first collection of three-part motets when he was only 15. He was soon employed in the court of Duke Gonzaga in Mantua, eventually becoming maestro di cappella, first in Mantua, and then in 1613 at the Cathedral of San Marco in Venice.

His creativity was astonishing; as well as producing sacred music for use in church liturgy and a vast output of madrigals, he is rightly credited as the father of opera as a distinct art form, with the production of L'Orfeo in 1607. He was attacked for departing from accepted compositional norms, for instance mixing secular and sacred traditions, as in the Vespers. Not until Bach, a century later, do we find such an extended and ambitious work showing mastery of many styles, the grand alongside the meditational, the divine rubbing shoulders with the human.

Monteverdi is indeed the bridge that leads from the Renaissance into the Baroque.

Messiah wasn't his first essay into this style he had composed Saul and Israel in Egypt in the two or three years before - but it was certainly the most immediately successful. Up to the mid-1730's Handel's stock in trade had been Opera, but Italianate productions were falling out of public favour and, in partnership with the librettist Charles Jennens, he turned to setting Biblical texts for the concert hall rather than the stage, but with all the instinct for drama that had established him as London's favourite. With Messiah as a result, we can be grateful to this turn in the fickle wheel of fashion.

HCS Artistic Advisor, English National Opera Director Martyn Brabbins, returns to the Town Hall podium for this concert, with our good friends the Orchestra of Opera North.

Handel's Oratorio Messiah is probably the most celebrated choral work and the Hallelujah Chorus is instantly recognisable. The HCS annual Christmas Messiah performance is a Huddersfield tradition. broken only once since 1864 when concert halls closed in the 2020 Covid pandemic. It is also the Choral's signature piece, with a number of notable recordings beginning with Sir Malcolm Sargent in the 1950's and most recently with Jane Glover (now Dame Jane Glover) in 2010.

One of the great choral masses, Mozart's Requiem in D minor was his last work and was unfinished on his death in 1791. It was completed the following year by Franz Sussmayr, who may have been working from notes or scraps left by the composer.

Its power and beauty, which make it such an audience favourite, have also given rise to various legends around its composition; that it was commissioned by an 'unknown, grey stranger' and that Mozart was convinced that he was composing his own funeral mass.





Those lucky enough to hear Ellie Slorach's conducting debut in an HCS season, at last year's Messiah, will know that there's a treat in store. Her fresh, lively interpretation won immediate praise and in this concert she has programmed a fascinating selection of music, from the 12th to 21st centuries, to stand alongside the Requiem.

You might be surprised to learn that Mozart's Requiem has a local connection. One of the most commonly performed completions of the work, in the Novello edition, was written by the string player and musicologist Duncan Druce, who for 13 years was Senior Lecturer at Bretton Hall College and later a visiting lecturer at the University of Huddersfield.



Roderick Williams OBE is an Honorary Patron of the Choral. So we are looking forward to our first performance of his Ave Verum Corpus Re-imagined with more than usual anticipation. Roderick has taken the harmonies of William Byrd's original – which we will also be performing – and shown just how extraordinarily inventive and 'modern' a composer the Elizabethan Byrd is.

Martyn Brabbins is Music Director of the English National Opera. An inspirational force in British music, Brabbins has had a busy opera career since his early days at the Kirov and more recently at La Scala, the Bayerische Staatsoper, and regularly in Lyon, Amsterdam, Frankfurt and Antwerp.

He is a popular figure at the BBC Proms, who in 2019 commissioned 14 living composers to write a birthday tribute to him. Known internationally for his advocacy of British composers, he has conducted hundreds of world premieres across the globe.

Martyn is Artistic Advisor to the Huddersfield Choral Society and has for many years supported professional, student and amateur music-making at the highest level in the UK.



Gregory Batsleer is acknowledged as one of the leading choral conductors of his generation, winning widespread recognition for his creativity and vision. He has been the Chorus Director of Huddersfield Choral Society since 2017, of the Scottish Chamber Orchestra Chorus since 2009, and was Chorus Director with the Royal Scottish National Orchestra from 2015 - 2021.

In 2021 he was appointed Festival Director for the London Handel Festival, leading its programming and development, and bringing Handel's music to the widest possible audiences. Gregory has worked with many of the UK's leading orchestras and ensembles. Recent highlights include performances with the Royal Northern Sinfonia, RSNO, National Youth Choir of Great Britain, Orchestra of Opera North, Manchester Camerata, Scottish Chamber Orchestra, Royal Liverpool Philharmonic Orchestra, English Chamber Orchestra and London Symphony Chorus.

He has devised performances for the Southbank Centre, Wilderness Festival and Latitude and is the co-founder and conductor of Festival Voices, a versatile ensemble dedicated to cross-art collaboration.

His outstanding work as a choral director was recognised with the 2015 Arts Foundation's first-ever Fellowship in Choral Conducting.



Ellie Slorach is Associate Choral Director of the Huddersfield Choral Society. Based in Manchester, she is the Founder and Artistic Director of Kantos Chamber Choir, and works in the UK and internationally with orchestras and choirs.

She has recently worked with The Hallé, BBC Singers and Orchestra of Opera North and was the Assistant Conductor for the Orchestra Philharmonique Royal de Liège in 2021-22, regularly returning as a guest conductor since.

In the 2023-24 season, Ellie has engagements with orchestras including the Royal Scottish National Orchestra, Royal Liverpool Philharmonic Orchestra, Royal Northern Sinfonia and Manchester Camerata.



Manchester Camerata celebrated its 50th anniversary in 2022 and is now one of the country's most sought-after ensembles, with a wide range of performance from Joy Division to Mozart.

According to The Times 'Probably Britain's most adventurous orchestra', the Camerata is becoming a familiar and welcome visitor to Huddersfield, most recently with the performance of J.S.Bach's St John Passion in April 2022.

opera north

The Orchestra of Opera North holds a unique place among British orchestras as the only ensemble with a year-round dual role in the opera house and concert hall, regularly performing major symphonic repertoire with international quest conductors and soloists.

The ensemble is at the heart of Opera North's celebrated concert stagings, from its RPS and Sky Arts Award-winning cycles of Wagner's Ring in 2016, to Turandot (2017), Salome (2018), Aida (2019) and Parsifal (2022). It works regularly with the Choral Society as well as being the resident orchestra for the Kirklees concert season.

The Orchestra has received international recognition for its recordings, notably a Gramophone Award-winning Troilus and Cressida; a series of Walton's orchestral music conducted by Paul Daniel; the complete Beethoven Piano Concertos with Howard Shelley; and Elgar's Caractacus with Huddersfield Choral Society and Martyn Brabbins.



We are bringing together some of the finest Baroque era instrumentalists in Britain for this concert. His Majesty's Sagbutts and Cornetts have established a worldwide reputation as virtuosi brass musicians over the last 40 years, and they will be joined by other leading Baroque players to recreate the soundworld of Claudio Monteverdi's masterwork, the Vespers of 1610, or as his title page has it Mass for the most Blessed Virgin for 6 voices and chorus.

That original print of 1610 contained both music for the Mass and various psalms – it was a "repertoire print", or what we would today call a 'collection'. It isn't therefore certain what combination of pieces the audience would have heard, but modern practice – since the piece was first recorded in the 1950's – is to follow the sequence as presented in the 1610 publication.

YOUTH **CHOIRS**



Formed in 1986, to give young people in Huddersfield and the surrounding area the opportunity to experience the joy of music making, the Huddersfield Choral Youth Choirs have a rich heritage of performing in venues large and small, for whatever the occasion, and this season has proved just that; from Holy Trinity Church to Huddersfield Town Hall, from Huddersfield Outdoor Market to St Bartholomew's Church, Marsden.

This season has seen us almost reach the numbers we had prior to lockdown, enabling us to build the choirs back into something like the wonderful ensembles we had in 2019/2020 season which saw the Young Voices get to the finals weekend of the BBC Songs of Praise Choir of the Year, before being robbed of the opportunity to compete there.

Our Young Voices, have grown in confidence and had a successful return to the Holmfirth Music Festival winning the trophy for the children's choir class in October. This opening term of the year saw us give our own festive concert at Holy Trinity Church and join our Choral family at the Society's Christmas concert in the Town Hall.

We had the pleasure of returning to the Town Hall in February, when, under the ever-present direction of Alison North MBE, the choirs once again triumphed at a wonderful Young Person's Choir evening at the Mrs Sunderland Festival as the joint Youth Choirs retained the Waverley School Trophy in the School Year 11 and under class, and in the Young People's Choir class – 21 years and under, the joint Youth Choirs gained a first place and Vocalise took second place in a reversal of last year's result.


